

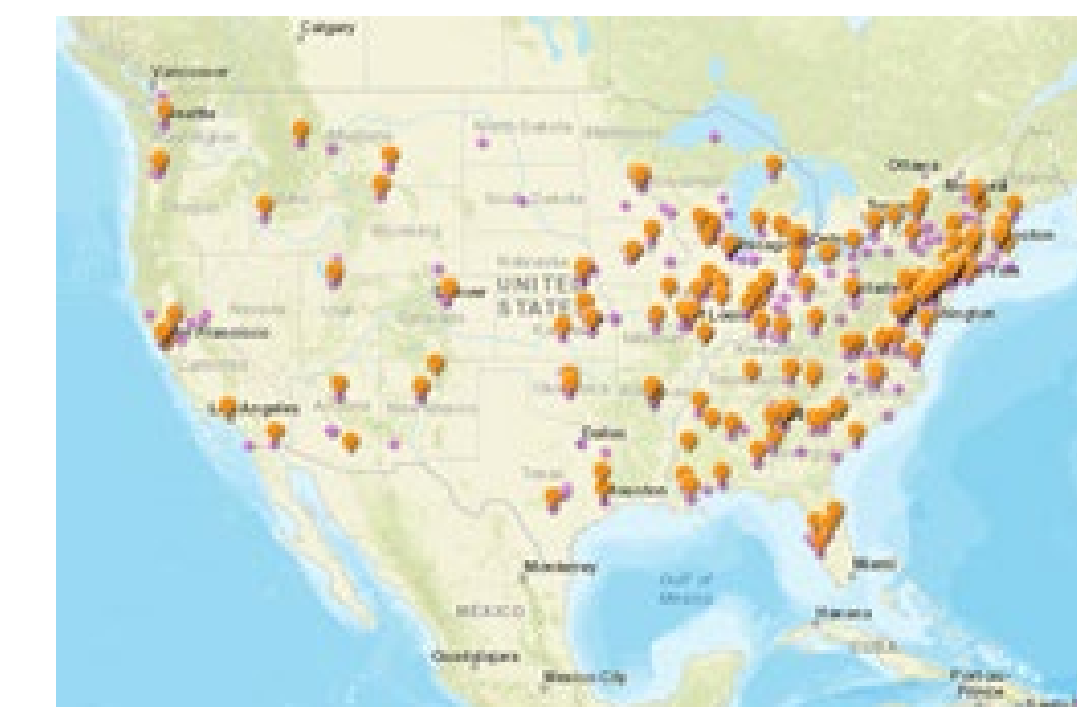

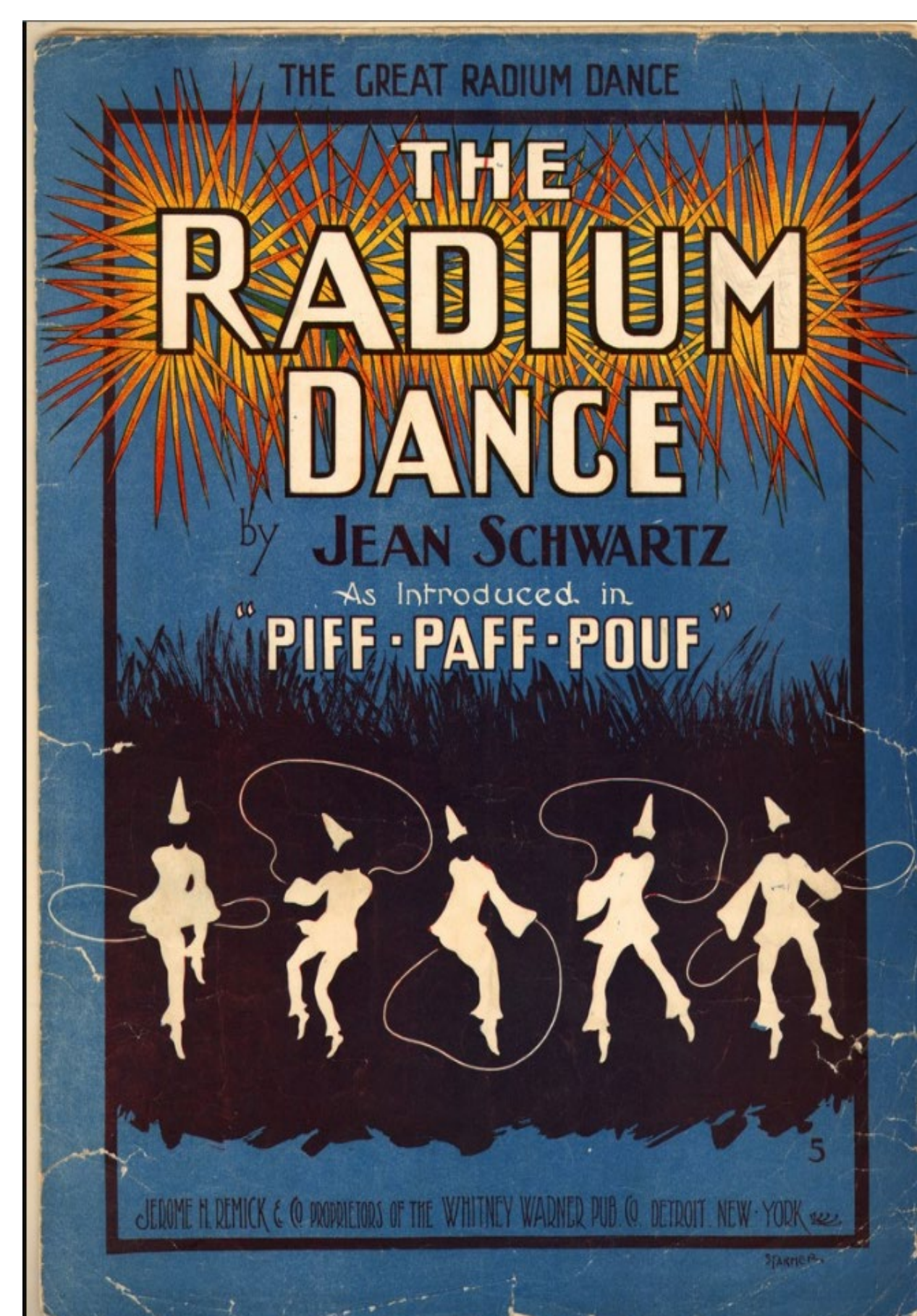


Evolution of Death Practices in the United States

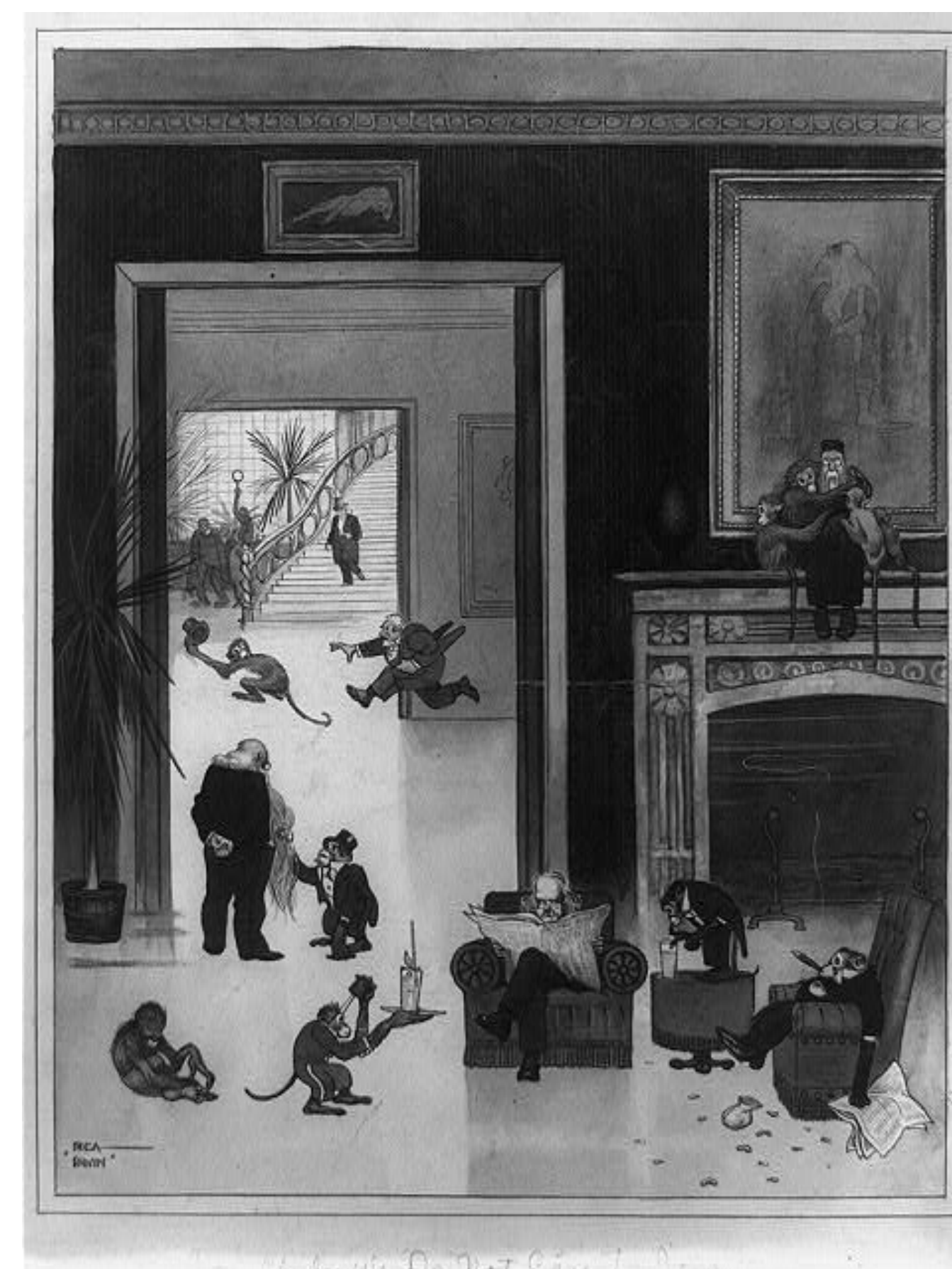
